



AUGUST 2018 NEWSLETTER

Well the good news is that the Winter Solstice has come and gone which for us in the southern hemisphere means that our days are getting longer, we are getting more vitamin D and theoretically it should be getting warmer with all the extra sun that we are being exposed to!

For those who have been living on Melton Wold for decades, in their view, is been a harsh winter, a winter that seems to be lingering on longer than is normal. 
